



NYS Baseball Hall of Fame


The New York State Baseball Hall of Fame Museum, 45 Harrison St., sits across from historic Parkhurst Field and celebrates the state's rich baseball legacy. This 6,500-squarefoot facility showcases signed jerseys, bats, gloves, World Series programs dating back to the early 1900s, and an extensive collection of autographed baseballs. Visitors can enjoy an immersive theater with stadium seating and the Wall of Fame honoring more than 150 inductees, from Major League players and coaches to umpires, writers, and broadcasters. Open Thursday-Sunday, 11-5 p.m. (Saturdays, 12-4 Free p.m.), admission.



The Glove Theatre Museum, 42 N. Main St., is located right next to the iconic Glove Theatre that was erected in 1914. Fun Fact: In 1928, the Glove Theatre became one of the very first theaters in United States to the equipped with sound, allowing it to show "talkies" at a time when most theaters were still silent. The museum presents a timeline of the historic theatre along with vintage movie posters, photos of stars, and a 1920s film projector. Dating back to the early 1900s, the theatre was once owned by Brothers. the Schine who brought in vaudeville acts such Jack Benny Ann and Rutherford, Free admission.

Fulton County Museum

The Fulton County Museum, 237 Kingsboro Ave., is housed in the former Kingsboro Elementary School, built in 1900 on the site of original 1831 Kingsboro the Academy in the historic Kingsboro District. Exhibits highlight Native American heritage, the glove and leather industry, the FJ&G Railroad, education, and military history. Fun fact: the museum's location ties directly back to Gloversville's first academy, making it both a cultural and educational landmark. Open May-October: Thursday-Sunday, 12-4 p.m., and Labor Day through Columbus Day: Saturdays and 12 - 4For Sundays, p.m. information, call (518) 725-2204.

Karpeles Manuscript Library Museum

The Karpeles Manuscript Library Museum, 66 Kingsboro Ave., is housed in a 1932 Christian Science church and is part of the world's largest private collection of original manuscripts spanning science, politics, literature. music, and art. Fun fact: exhibits rotate several times each year between Karpeles' various locations, so each visit brings something new.
