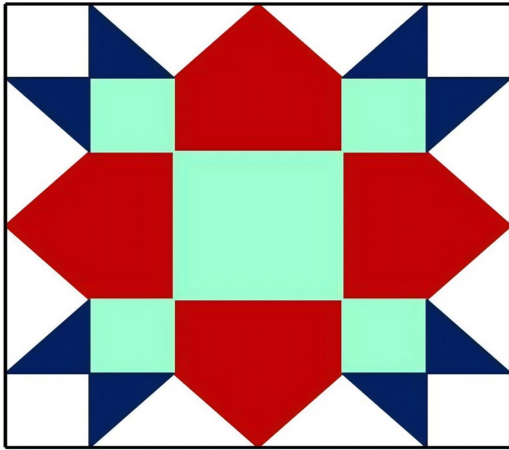

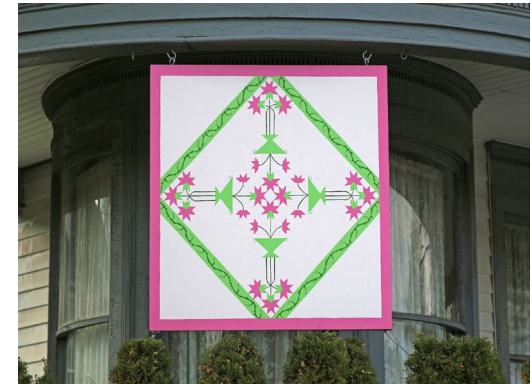


Barn quilt trails are a unique way to see the history of Gloversville and learn about its neighborhoods. According to the Fulton Montgomery Quilt Barn Trail, wooden barn quilt squares can be based on traditional patterns with individual influences making them unique to each property and community. Be sure to pick up the full trail brochure to visit all the region's squares.

1. Private home at 45 Park Street. This pattern includes a hidden cross.



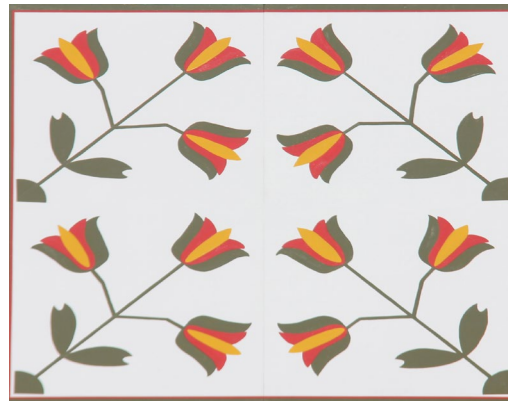
2. Amico Funeral Home at 150 South Main St. This pattern is called the "Carolina Lilly," a popular type of funeral flower. The Victorian building has served the Gloversville community since 1894.



3. Herrl Woodcraft and HW Custom Kitchens, 39 Hamilton Street. This quilt Square is called “Craftsman” and has tools in the middle of its pattern. The family-owned and operated small business builds kitchens, cabinetry, hutches and more.



4. Fulton County Museum, 237 Kingsboro Avenue, hosts a tulip pattern. It should be noted that the Fulton County Museum is the original site of the 1831 Kingsboro Academy and is in the Historic District.



5. Kingsboro Lumber, 22 Gregory Street, hosts a “Carpenter’s Wheel” square. More than a lumber store, Kingsboro Lumber is a hardware store that caters to both professional contractors and homeowners.
